Countdown to **GRADUATION**

On pages 22-23, there is a guide for middle and high school students to learn what needs to be checked off their "to-do" list by the end of every school year, leading up to high school graduation.



Arkansas Next magazine

Students will spend 10 minutes reading through the list and answering the following questions on a separate piece of paper. After the 10 minutes are up, turn to your neighbor(s) or break up into groups and discuss their answers to the following questions for another 10 minutes.

- 1. Based on this list, what have you already completed?
- 2. If you haven't completed anything yet, what is something you think needs to be done soon?
- 3. Does anything on this list surprise you?
- **4.** Do you plan on going to college? If so, where? If not, what do you want to do after graduation?

Once the discussion wraps up, the teacher may ask a few students to share what they discussed with their neighbor(s). Give an opportunity for other students to pitch in by raising their hands if they want to share something, as well.

Students will put together a 5-part slideshow using Canva, Google Slides or PowerPoint based on the future they want to invest in. Answer the following questions when creating the slideshow:

- **1.** What pathway do you want to follow?
- 2. Why did you choose this option?
- 3. What kind of careers do you see yourself pursuing with this option in mind? How much do these jobs make on average in Arkansas?
- **4.** Why should others consider this pathway, as well?
- 5. What is something new you learned about this option/pathway?

Spend 20 minutes creating this slideshow. Once the 20 minutes are complete, students will present to their peers.

Go to **page 41** and analyze the data laid out. Have the students stand up and move to the center of the room. Once there, ask them to choose a side based on the following topic:

LEFT SIDE OF THE ROOM: FOR STUDENT LOANS

Have volunteers on each side discuss why they chose their side of the room. This is not a debate, simply ask them to share their opinions.

RIGHT SIDE OF THE ROOM:

LEFT SIDE OF THE ROOM:

INTERESTED IN ENTERING THE WORKFORCE RIGHT AFTER HIGH SCHOOL

Have volunteers on each side discuss why they chose their side of the room. This is not a debate, simply ask them to share their opinions on why they are eager to enter the workforce and why others are not.

Once done, ask the students to write a 150-word (half-page) paper on whether they are for or against student loans. Turn in for a grade or extra credit.

WHAT YOU'LL NEED:

Go to page 36 and read about the statistics of high school athletes going pro. After, have the students stand up and move to the center of the room.

LEFT SIDE OF THE ROOM: GOING "PRO" IS NOT REALISTIC

Go to page 46 and read about the Arkansas young adults turning

their dreams into reality with influencing online or in their community. After, have the students stand up and move to the center of the room.

Once there, ask them to choose a side based on the following topic:

WHAT YOU'LL NEED: Arkansas Next magazine Students will be standing




RIGHT SIDE OF THE ROOM: INFLUENCING IS A STABLE CAREER




WHAT YOU'LL NEED:

Students can create a slideshow or simply write out their presentation and share it with the class.














Extra Credit



YOUNG PROFESSIONALS PRESENTATION

WHAT YOU'LL NEED:

Arkansas Next magazine2 pieces of paper1 pencil/pen per student

Starting on page 77, students will discover 12 profiles of real young professionals in Arkansas who are actively living their dream jobs in trade careers.

Split students into groups of two or three, and assign each group one profile story to read. Based on what they read, have each group present to the class what they learned about this career.

During their presentation, students should answer the following questions:

- **1.** What is this young professional's job?
- **2.** What responsibilities does this person have at their job?
- **3.** How much does this career make on average?

- **4.** What kind of person would be good at this job?
- **5.** What did they learn from this story?

After the groups have presented their profiles, students should write down a 150-word (halfpage) paper on what career interested them the most that was presented in class. Now, let them vote...

WHAT YOU'LL NEED:
